BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

BELL, CLARE

Born in England, Ms. Bell entered the United States in 1957 and became a naturalized citizen. She gained an MSME in engineering design from Stanford in 1983. At present she works as an equipment engineer for a major computer company. She has published two outstanding and award-winning books in Ratha's Creature and its sequel, Clan Ground.

CURRY, GINGER SIMPSON

The Atlantic Ocean and its denizens have fascinated Ginger Simpson Curry from the age of five when her father taught her to swim in the swells. When she was awarded \$2,500 as a Florida Artist in Literature Fellow in 1982-83 for her short fiction, she invested in scuba gear and lessons and has been exploring the ocean bottom ever since. Married to an electronic technician who has introduced her to the world of word processing, she is currently Fiction Chairman for Florida Freelance Writers' Association.

GRAVEL, GEARY

He has been a nationally certified Sign Language Interpreter for the Deaf since 1978. He is the author of two novels, *The Alchemists*, which was nominated for the Philip

K. Dick Award as most outstanding original science fiction paperback of 1984, and a sequel, *The Pathfinders*. He lives and works in Amherst, Massachusetts.

She works in the travel industry, but so far has only dealt with trips in this world. She has been a fan of the Witch World since girlhood. Her pursuits include cat-taming,

He spent two years with the 101st Airborne Division, ETO, as a machine gunner and forty-two years as a Southern Baptist pastor, including three and a half years in Brazil as a missionary. His hobbies include collecting and reading science fiction, painting, fencing, and archery. He also writes.

Her first published story was for the *Darkover* magazine and she says of herself that she is a sporadically unemployed accountant with two daughters, two cats, a husband, and an elderly bassett hound, who lives in New Mexico and sometimes goes to Santa Fe opera.
